

Get Recruited as a Long Snapper

General Long Snappers Recruiting Information

- Size of a collegiate Long Snapper will vary by coach preference and their special teams (i.e. a bigger sized kid for schools that require a snapper to block after snapping vs. a taller, quicker long snapper for schools that want their athlete to be the first one down the field).
- Snap time (moment a long snapper moves the ball to when the punter catches it) should be .75 or better.
- D1 programs prioritize a snap time that is .75 or better. Though, slower but more consistent snappers are also prioritized in the recruiting process. Comparing 2 long snappers, if 1 snaps a .7 and the other snaps a .78 but is more accurate, the coach will take him every time.

Highlight Video Tips

- Include an intro with your name, state, height, weight, grad year, GPA and contact info.
- You should have footage of you snapping with shoulder pads on.
- Provide continuous tape with 10 straight snaps for punt and 10 straight snaps for field goals/point after touchdown to demonstrate consistency.
- Include footage of you blocking and running down field, especially if you're applying to a school with a blocking scheme. Show them your footwork going up against another player.
- If you are looking at programs with a scheme that allows you to snap and run, make sure you can get a wide angle of you running 40 yards down field and breaking down for a tackle.
- Length of film should not be more than five minutes long.

Additional Recruiting Tips to Know

- Jumpstart your game plan to get recruited to play in college by focusing on creating highlight film, attending college camps and position specific camps, and researching/generating a list of target schools.
- Being proactive and getting on a coach's radar is key. Sending film and an introductory email is a great start.
- Unless you are ranked in the top 10 or position as the number 1-20 long snapper in the country, recruiting is going to start later in high school.
- Going to college camps should be your main focus during sophomore and junior summers.
- College Special teams' camps are a great way to not only see the campus, but also snap in front of college coaches.
- Going to big D1 Special Teams camps will give the snapper an opportunity to snap in front of smaller coaches, since bigger schools invite coaches from mid-level schools in the area to attend.
- Attend sport-specific camps (such as Rubio Long Snapping Camps) and work with knowledgeable staff.

Football Recruiting Calendar

Dead period: No in-person contact with coaches; coaches and recruits can communicate via all digital communication channels

- Division 1 FBS: Aug. 1-31, 2020; Dec. 14, 2020 Jan. 14, 2021; Feb. 1-28, 2021; June 28 - July 24, 2021
- Division 1 FCS: Aug. 1–31, 2020; Dec. 14, 2020 Jan. 14, 2021; Feb. 1–4, 2021
- Division 2: Dec. 14 (7 am) Dec. 16 (7 am), 2020; Jan. 11-13, 2021; Feb. 1 (7 am) - Feb. 3 (7 am), 2021

Quiet period: Talk to college coaches on their campus but no in-person contact off the college campus

- Division 1 FBS: Sept. 1 Nov. 28, 2020; Dec. 13, 2020; Jan. 8-10, 2021 (only National Service Academies); Jan. 31, 2021; March 1 – April 14, 2021; All days in April & May not used for an athletic or academic evaluation; June 1-27, 2021; July 25 - July 31, 2021
- Division 1 FCS: Sept. 1 Nov. 28, 2020; Dec. 13, 2020; Jan. 31, 2021; Feb. 5 - April 14, 2021; June 1 - July 31, 2021

• Division 2: June 1 - start of recruit's first scheduled football practice; March 9 - May 31, 2021 (except for evaluation period dates)

Evaluation period: Coaches can watch a game/practice or visit a recruit's school but no in-person communication off the college campus

- Division 1 FBS and FCS: Coaches have 42 evaluation dates during Sept., Oct., & Nov.; April 15 - May 31, 2021 (except for Memorial Day and Sundays)
- Division 2: During the recruit's football season, starting with the first scheduled practice; Nov. 1-30, 2020; April 15 - May 31, 2021 (four weeks designated by school as an evaluation period, excluding Memorial Day and Sundays)

Contact period: All communication is fair game

- Division 1 FBS and FCS: Nov. 29, 2020 Dec. 12, 2020; Dec. 13-19, 2020 (national service academies only); Jan. 15–30, 2021; During these periods recruit can have 6 in-person, off-campus contacts with college coaches, can't meet with a coach more than once/week
- Division 2: Dec. 1, 2020 March 8, 2021 (except for dead period dates)
